Recent Meeting Highlights December 16,2024

This past Monday we had the honor of having Dr. James Miller as our guest speaker. Dr. Miller has retired from internal medicine. He spoke about the garden at the Rising Sun Missionary Baptist Church in Austin which began in 2014. He explained the educational and community needs of the Austin community.

Dr Miller explained how the community where he serves is considered a food desert. He and others are on a mission to involve the community in the growth process offering fresh foods and empowerment. Although





considered "concrete deserts", he explained that one can grow healthy foods in containers. Some of the limitations are the lack of volunteers to work in the gardens as well as distributing food items when they serve 1 -2 days weekly.

Looking towards the future he would like to build partnerships with hospitals and local churches. Other areas of conversation were about how one maintains the grounds in the growing season. He also discussed the negative health effects of too much sugar and artificial sweeteners; and how growing your own food will give people the advantage of knowing their food is safe when there are so many food recalls.
